














#### Student Growth by Grade





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

## WASHINGTON ELEMENTARY SCHOOL 2016-2017

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#### **School Narrative**

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We continue our Partnership with Montclair State University. We became a field site for students enrolled in ECEL 200 Perspective on Early Childhood Education and Elementary Education in Democracy. This course is prerequisite for application to Montclair State University's Teacher Education Program for early childhood and elementary teacher candidates. Each student attended an orientation program at our school. They spent a whole day of visitation in our school with a host teacher. The goal of the visit was to enable the students to make an informed decision about entering the programs at Montclair and considering teaching as a career. The students also attended school related meetings and competed 15 hours of community service.
