Student- Athletes & NCAA Eligibility Center

Student-athletes that want to play sports on the collegiate level at a Division I or II school MUST first meet eligibility through the NCAA Clearinghouse prior to high school graduation.


- → <u>GPA</u>- NCAA calculates GPA based on the grades earned in the NCAA-approved courses. These courses begin in freshman year!
 - DI requires a minimum of a 2.3 GPA
 - DII requires a minimum of a 2.2 GPA
- → <u>TEST SCORES</u>- Division I and II schools use sliding scales to match test scores (SAT/ACT) and GPA to determine eligibility.

What are the Academic Requirements?

- Graduate from high school.
- •Complete 16 NCAA approved courses. (10 of these must be completed by the end of Junior year).
- Earn a minimum required *core course* grade- point average (GPA).
- Achieve the required SAT or ACT sum score.
