NATIONAL SCHOOL COUNSELING WEEK . FEB. 4-8, 2019

National School Counseling Week 2019, "School Counselors: Providing Lessons for Life,"

National School Counseling Week, sponsored by ASCA, highlights the tremendous impact school counselors can have in helping students achieve school success and plan for a career.

At West Orange High School our curriculum includes goals for each grade level. In ninth grade the focus is on orientation to the high school, its rules and regulations, study skills and graduation requirements. In the student's sophomore year we encourage students to identify work values in order to make age appropriate, responsible decisions. In the junior year we like to meet with students and their parents to review their academic accomplishments and discuss the appropriate tests and possible post-high school plans. Seniors and their parents should work directly with their counselors in selecting schools, filling out applications and planning possible job hunting strategies.

Counselors are available to answer questions and meet with interested and concerned parents. Whether parents are concerned about how to improve their children's self-esteem, social development, behavior at home or school or need advice because of a crisis situation, a call to (973) 669-5301 to make an appointment will connect them with a counselor. February is Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month!

Unhealthy relationships can start early and last a lifetime. Teens often think some behaviors, like teasing and name calling, are a "normal" part of a relationship. However, these behaviors can become abusive and develop into more serious forms of

violence. Teen DV Month (sometimes called TDVAM) is a national effort to raise awareness about abuse in teen and 20-something relationships and promote programs

that prevent it.

Teen dating violence (TDV) is defined as a pattern of abuse or threat of abuse against teenaged dating partners, occurring in different forms, including verbal, emotional, physical, sexual and digital. TDV occurs across diverse groups and cultures.

Dating violence is more common than many parents think. One in three teens in the U.S. will experience physical, sexual or emotional abuse by someone they are in a relationship with before they become adults. Parents and caregivers play a critical role in preventing and responding to dating violence. Parents and caregivers can model and instill values that promote healthy dating relationships as well as observe signs of dating abuse or perpetration, and seek appropriate help for their children.

Every year, approximately 1.5 million high school students nationwide experience physical abuse from a dating partner. It is also known that 3 in 4 parents have never talked to their children about domestic violence.

- **82% of parents believe teen dating violence is not an issue or admit they don't know if it's an issue. (breakthecycle.org)
- **Dating violence can happen to anyone regardless of age, financial status, race, gender, sexual orientation or background ((loveisrespect.org)
- **Only 1/3 of the teens who were involved in an abusive relationship confided in someone about the violence. (dosomethingnow.org)

In light of these alarming facts, every year during the month of February advocates join efforts to raise awareness about dating violence, highlight promising practices, and encourage communities to get involved.

Dating Violence Information for Parents

Many times, teens who are involved in an abusive relationship will remain silent. They will not ask for help or seek guidance until after they have already suffered for a period of time._This can cause serious physical, emotional, and mental damage to a developing teen.

As adults, these teens are more likely to be withdrawn and depressed. Teens who were victims of abuse are also more likely to be violent and abusive themselves. This can create a neverending cycle of abuse. Fortunately, there are certain early warning signs that can help you detect dating violence.

These signs can help you intervene and speak with a teen about dating violence before it gets out of hand. Early intervention is the best way to handle an abusive situation before It has the opportunity to escalate. It is important to note that each relationship is different. Behavior that is normal in one relationship may be abusive in a different relationship .However, the following warning signs are generally indicative of abuse:

Your teen's partner behaves in a way that is extremely jealous or possessive,

such as checking in on your daughter or son often

You observe verbal abuse, such as name-calling or demeaning comments

Your teen gives up things that are important, such as time with friends and family, activities or other interests

Your teen has unexplained injuries

Your teen's partner abuses other people or animals.

Help us spread awareness and stop dating abuse before it starts!

It may be hard to think of your teen as having an intimate relationship, let alone an abusive one. But if you suspect dating violence, your son or daughter needs your support..

What You Can Do?

Tell your teen that you are concerned for his or her safety. Point out that what is happening is not normal. Everyone deserves a safe and healthy relationship. Offer to connect your teen with a professional, such as a counselor or attorney, who will keep the conversations confidential.

Be supportive and understanding. Stress to your teen that you are on his or her side. Provide information and non-judgmental support. Let your teen know that the abuse is not his or her fault and that no one deserves to be abused. Make it clear that you don't blame your teen and that you respect his or her choices.

The 2019 W.E.B. DuBois Scholars Institute

The Institute is held on the campus of Princeton University from late June to early July. Founded in the summer of 1988, the W.E.B. DuBois Scholars Institute provides scholarship and leadership training for high-achieving youth. Each year for more than 30 years, the overall average SAT score for our W.E.B. DuBois Scholars has been significantly higher than national norms. Approximately 99% of the participants attend college and graduate. An overwhelming majority of them attend highly selective colleges and universities. The Institute prides itself in the development of all their scholars to pursue greatness not only personally but also academically and professionally. It is accomplishments, such as these, that are encouraged and strengthened at the Summer Institute

While in residence at the Summer Institute, participants receive between four and five weeks of rigorous instruction in university level courses taught by university professors, post-doctoral fellows, and doctoral candidates from top research universities and institutions throughout the country. The Institute aims to sharpen students' research and quantitative analysis skills, as well as writing, verbal, and critical reading skills through a diversity of high-level academic courses. Students entering the Eighth, Ninth, Tenth, Eleventh and Twelfth grades in the fall of 2019 are eligible to participate.

The total cost for room, board, tuition, books, meals and trips is \$6,500 for students who qualify as Scholars--students entering tenth, eleventh and twelfth grades by fall of 2019. The fee is \$4,800 for students who qualify as Pre-Scholars- students entering eighth and ninth grade by fall of 2019.
