Founding of the VFW Post #376 of West Orange

The Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) was first organized in 1913 with the emergence of two organizations of Spanish-American War veterans. The VFW post in West Orange was founded only eight years later, as best can be determined, with 27 founding members. Twenty of these members served in the Army and seven served in the Navy. All were WWI veterans with the exception of John Underwood, a West Orange resident who served during the Spanish-American War.

In West Orange, like countless communities across the country, many young men were eager to serve when the United States joined the World War in 1918. They all likely left West Orange and joined the patriotic cause with a youthful sense of invincibility and adventure. In total, 150 young boys left West Orange but in the harsh reality of war 28 never returned home. West Orange officials were quick to honor them and subsequently inscribed their names on a bronze plaque in the newly created War Memorial Park in 1920.

Today the original park and plague is known as Veterans Memorial Park located on the grounds of West Orange Township Hall. It was dedicated on July 20, 1920 when the plague was unveiled and West Orange veterans of the World War were presented with a special medal inscribed: Presented by the people of West Orange, N.J. in grateful recognition of service in the World War 1917-1918.


This inspired the war veterans to form a VFW post in West Orange the following year. It was named for two boyhood friends John Glennon and James Sayers who grew up in West Orange and were affectionately known as "Stickey" and "Jumbo". When the United States entered the great war they were quick to answer the call to duty. They both enlisted on the same day and served in Company B of the 113th Infantry attached to the Blue and Gray Division. On October 12, 1918 both childhood pals John Glennon and James Sayers were killed in combat nearly at the same time. Their names became the standard bearer for West Orange Glennon/Sayers VFW Post #376. The post's first commander was James A. Glennon, brother of John Glennon.

No surviving records from the formation of Post #376 other than the original registration cards exist. They seem to indicate that the founding members from October 1921 are: Herbert Barry, George Boetash, William E. Brennan, Anthony A. Christiano, Nicholas J. Christiano, John Deckenback, Bernard M. Degnan, Richard J. Fagan, Edward J. Feeney, James A Glennon, Matthew T. Glynn Jr., Harry H. Hain, Gibson Hallett, Albert M. Heis, Benjamin E. Jaggers, Foster Kells, William Landers, George Mulvihill, Hugh McCartney, John McLoughlin, Charles E. Ober, George H. Pflug, John Preiss, Liberto L. Santucci, John Schack, Robert

V. Sphale, Alfonso Tarantino, and John J. Underwood. These are presumably the 27 members seen in the only known group photo of the founding members taken in 1921. (pictured below)

Of these founding post members Herbert Barry served as the President of the West Orange Board of Education from 1923 to 1934. Bernard M. Degnan served as West Orange Mayor from 1938 to 1951. Harry H. Hain served as West Orange Police Chief from 1938 to 1957. Anthony Christiano and George Mulvihill both served on the West Orange Police Department. Richard J. Fagan is the great uncle of Township Historian Joseph Fagan and James Sayers for whom the post is partially named is the great uncle of Township Business Administrator Jack Sayers.

The West Orange Glennon/Sayers VFW Post #376 celebrates 100 years of service to the community this year. They were responsible for the subsequent inclusion of memorials honoring West Orange residents who perished in World War II, Korea, and Vietnam. On May 31, 1999 the memorials were refurbished and cleaned and West Orange War Memorial Park was rededicated as Veterans Plaza thanks to the efforts of the VFW. They also donated the US Army M1A1 57mm anti-tank gun currently on permanent display there. In a sad twist of fate, the much beloved commander of VFW post #376 Ralph Panciello passed away this past March 11th in the 100th year of their existence in West Orange and whose presence will be deeply missed.

Veterans mostly received federal or state medals for their service during World War I. It was rare for a town to recognize veterans in the same manner. Seen here is the official town World War I medal issued by West Orange. This one belonged to an unknown recipient that was presented to all West Orange veterans of the World War on July 20, 1920 in a ceremony at War Memorial Park. It is inscribed: Presented by the people of West Orange, N.J. in grateful recognition of service in the World War 1917-1918.



Ralph Panciello was born and raised in Orange in 1928 before moving to West Orange 60 years ago. He worked as a machinist for Lock Joint Pipe Company in East Orange before retirement. Ralph proudly served in the United States Army during World War II. He was a member of Glennon-Sayers VFW Post #376 and served as post commander for many years. It was under his watch the post reached its 100th anniversary. Ralph was a fixture at the town's annual Memorial Day Ceremony for more than 20 years. He was best known for leading the crowd in reciting the Pledge of Allegiance. He also was a member of West Orange Elks BPOE #1590, and former Deputy Mayor of West Orange Township. His presence will be sorely missed but always fondly remembered.

Observance

In traditional observance, the flag of the United States is raised briskly to the top of the staff and then solemnly lowered to the half-staff position, where it remains only until noon. It is then raised to full-staff for the remainder of the day. The half-staff position remembers the more than one million men and women who gave their lives in service of their country. At noon, their memory is raised by the living, who resolve not to let their sacrifice be in vain, but to rise up in their stead and continue the fight for liberty and justice for all.



The "National Moment of Remembrance" resolution of December 2000 asks that at 3pm local time all Americans "voluntarily and informally observe in their own way a Moment of Remembrance and respect, pausing from whatever they are doing for a moment of silence or listening to Taps."


